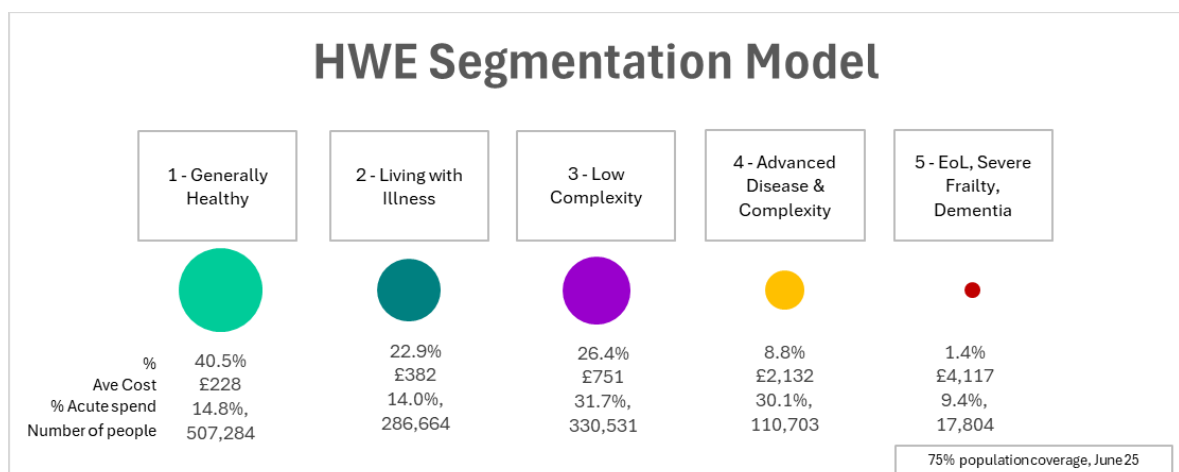
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2. DELPPHI Data Platform Updates

Development of DELPPHI continues with the following key updates:

- DELPPHI Users Working group is now set up with representation from partners across the system to support production of outputs using various dashboards and tools that are available/in pipeline.
- Primary Care Data Quality sub-group has been set up and will feedback to ICB's Data Quality Working Group.
- Build work continues to progress for the following dashboards:
 - Population Profile
 - Demand Management and System Resilience
 - MTP
 - System Utilisation
 - Self-service report
- The following tools are now live and further engagement is underway to support usage:
 - Frailty Interventions Dashboard
 - Risk of Emergency Admission Model
 - Segmentation Model - below is a snapshot of our current segments:



3. Scenario Modelling – partnership with University of Hertfordshire

We have recently showcased our partnership approach to scenario modelling at the [Eastern Partnerships for Innovation in Integrated Care \(EPIC\) Inaugural Conference](#) which was hosted by the University of Suffolk in March.
